6 George IV – Chapter 27

An Act to continue for a limited time, a certain Act therein-mentioned, passed in the fourth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to repeal a certain Act therein-mentioned, and to provide for the Police of the Borough of William Henry and certain other Villages in this Province." (29th March, 1826.)

Whereas it is expedient to continue an act passed in the fourth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to repeal a certain Act therein-mentioned, and to provide for the Police of the Borough of William Henry [Sorel-Tracy], and certain other Villages in this Province," the duration of which is limited to the first day of May of the present year, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-six: Be it therefore enacted by tire King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North-America,' and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;" And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same that the said Act passed in the fourth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to repeal a certain Act therein-mentioned, and to provide for the Police of the Borough of William Henry and certain other Villages in this Province," shall continue to be and remain in force, until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and thirty and no longer.
