7 George IV – Chapter 9

An Act to amend an Act passed in the sixth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to provide for the summary Trial of certain Small Causes." (7th March, 1827.)

Whereas it is expedient to amend an Act passed in the sixth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to provide for the summary Trial of certain Small Causes," in such manner that persons selling Spirituous Liquors as Merchants, Shop-keepers, or Traders, to be carried away and not to be drunk in their house or houses, or on their premises, may not be disqualified to act as Commissioners for the Trial of Small Causes, or as Clerks to such Commissioners under the aforesaid Act;—Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great-Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North-America;' and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;" And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that from and after the passing of this Act, persons selling Spirituous Liquors, as Merchants, Shop-keepers or Traders, to be carried away and not to be drunk in their house or houses, or on their premises, may be appointed Commissioners or Clerks to such Commissioners for the purposes aforesaid, any thing in the said Act contained to the contrary in any wise notwithstanding.
