

## C A P. XXXVIII.

AN ACT to appropriate a certain sum of money to indemnify the Arbitrator appointed for adjusting the proportion of the Revenue appertaining to Upper Canada.

(26th March, 1830.)

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

Preamble.

£100 granted to the Honbl. John Richardson for his services as arbitrator.

**W**HEREAS it is expedient to appropriate a certain sum of money to indemnify the Honorable John Richardson of Montreal, for his disbursements as Arbitrator for regulating the proportion of the Revenue appertaining to the Province of Upper Canada: May it therefore please your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America*;" and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;" And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that it shall be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or person administering of the Government, to pay by Warrant or Warrants under his hand, a sum not exceeding one hundred pounds currency, out of any unappropriated monies in the hands of the Receiver-General, to indemnify the said Honorable John Richardson, of Montreal, for his disbursements as Arbitrator for regulating the proportion of the Revenues appertaining to the Province of Upper Canada.

Application of the monies to be accounted for to His Majesty.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the due application of the monies hereby appropriated, shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His heirs and Successors, through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, his Heirs and Successors shall be pleased to direct.
