

His Majesty to have an Hypothèque on the building in which the collection is now placed.

IV. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall have an *hypothèque* on the building in which the said Collection is now placed, for the payment of the monies advanced under the authority of this Act, which *hypothèque* shall commence from the passing of this Act.

Pierre Chasseur to keep open his collection.

V. Provided always and be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the said Pierre Chasseur shall continue to lodge, preserve and keep open for public inspection the said Collection, at such rates of admission, and under such regulations as may be approved by the said Trustees.

On payment of the monies advanced, Pierre Chasseur to re-enter in possession of the collection, and if not, collection to be vested in the Trustees.

VI. Provided also, and be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that upon the payment by the said Pierre Chasseur to the Receiver General of the Province for the public uses thereof, of the monies advanced under the authority of this Act, and of the monies advanced under the authority of the Act before cited, at any time after the expiration of five years, and before the expiration of ten years after the passing of this Act, the said Pierre Chasseur shall re-enter into full possession of the said Collection and become again Proprietor thereof, and that if such repayment be not so made, the property of the said Collection shall be vested in the said Trustees or their successors in their said quality, for the benefit of the public for ever, any thing to the contrary in the said Act notwithstanding.

Application of the monies to be accounted for to His Majesty.

VII. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the due application of the monies appropriated by this Act, shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall direct.

C A P. LIII.

AN Act to enable His Majesty to defray certain arrears of expenses appertaining to the Civil Government of this Province.

(26th March, 1830.)

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

Preamble.

WHEREAS by Message of His Excellency Sir James Kempt, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, and Administrator of the Government of Lower Canada, laid before the Assembly of this Province, a supply is required to defray certain unprovided for expenses for the Civil Government

Government therein mentioned:—We your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Commons of Lower Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, most humbly beseech your Majesty that it may be enacted: and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled, An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America,*" and to make further provision for the Government "of the said Province;" And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Person Administering the Government, by a Warrant or Warrants under his hand, to pay or cause to be paid from and out of any unappropriated monies which are, or hereafter may be, in the hands of the Receiver General of this Province, the following sums that is to say, a sum not exceeding seven hundred and sixty-seven pounds seventeen shillings sterling, to enable His Majesty to defray certain expenses of the Civil Government for the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty nine, which remain unpaid. A sum not exceeding one hundred and sixty-nine pounds eleven shillings and ten pence sterling, to reimburse a similar sum advanced during the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty nine by His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, for certain indispensable repairs to the Gaol at Three Rivers. A sum not exceeding one hundred and forty-three pounds seventeen shillings and two pence, sterling, to reimburse a similar sum advanced by His Excellency the Administrator of the Government, for the construction of fire proof vaults and offices, for the Receiver General in the Old Château. A sum not exceeding four pounds ten shillings sterling, to reimburse a similar sum paid to Augustin Jourdain, employed by the Board of Officers, charged with the duty of counting the monies of the Receiver General. A sum not exceeding two pounds three shillings and ten pence, sterling, to reimburse certain monies advanced in payment of labourers employed in removing chests containing monies, in the examination of the Public Treasure. A sum not exceeding five pounds sterling, to defray the expenses, and for remuneration of James Brown, when sent to examine and report upon the value of two houses purchased for School Houses by the Trustees of the Parish of Saint-Pierre-les-Becquets.

Certain sums of money granted, to reimburse the like sums advanced for certain services.

C A P. LIV.

An Act to make provision for defraying the Civil Expenditure of the Provincial Government for the current year.

(26th March, 1830.)

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

Preamble.

WHEREAS by Message of His Excellency Sir James Kempt, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, and Administrator of the Government of Lower-Canada, laid before both Houses of the Legislature, it appears that the funds already appropriated by Law are not adequate to defray the whole expenses of Your Majesty's Civil Government of this Province, and of the Administration of Justice and other expenses mentioned in the said Message; and whereas it is expedient to make further provision towards defraying the same for the year commencing the first day of January one thousand eight hundred and thirty, and ending on the thirty-first day of December in the same year:—We, Your Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Lower Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, most humbly beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great-Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "*An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North-America,*" and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province:—And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that from and out of the unappropriated monies which now are or shall hereafter come into the hands of the Receiver General of the Province for the time being, there shall be supplied and paid towards defraying the expenses of the Administration
