9 George IV – Chapter 70

An Act to appropriate a certain sum of Money towards defraying the expenses of the Civil Government, incurred during the year eighteen hundred and twenty-eight, and also certain expenses of preceding years. (14th March, 1829.)

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

Whereas by Message of His Excellency Sir James Kempt, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Honorable Military Order of the Bath, and Administrator of the Government of Lower-Canada, bearing date the twenty-seventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and twenty-nine, laid before the Assembly of this Province, a supply is required, to defray certain, expences of the Civil Government therein mentioned: We Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Lower-Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, most humbly beseech Your Majesty, that it may be enacted and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great-Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America,' and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;" And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that from and after the passing of this Act, it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or person administering the Government of the Province, for the time being, by a Warrant or Warrants under his hand, to pay or cause to be paid, for the purposes of defraying the said expenses of the Civil Government of Lower-Canada, incurred in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-eight, and also certain expenses of preceding years, a sum not exceeding nine thousand and thirty-one pounds, three shillings and six pence, sterling, from and out of the unappropriated monies which now are or hereafter may be in the hands of the Receiver General of this Province.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the due application of the monies by this Act appropriated, shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall be pleased to direct.

III. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that a detailed account of the monies expended under the authority of this Act, shall be laid before the House of Assembly within fifteen days after the opening of the next Session of the Provincial Parliament.
