## An Act to make provision for indemnifying Pilots while detained in Quarantine. (18th March, 1834.)

Whereas considerable loss and inconvenience have been experienced by the Pilots in charge of vessels coming from sea to the Quarantine Station at Grosse Isle, in consequence of the absence of all Legislative enactment to empower them to claim indemnity for the time that they are detained in Quarantine at the place aforesaid:—Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America,' and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;" And it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that from and after the passing of this Act any Pilot in charge of a vessel arriving in this Province, who shall be detained in Quarantine at Grosse Isle, shall be entitled to ten shillings currency, for every day that he shall be so detained, which sum shall be paid him by the Master or Consignee of such vessel in the same manner as pilotage is now directed by Law to be paid to Pilots for and below the Harbour of Quebec.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that tills Act shall continue to be in force until the first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and no longer.
