CHAP. LV.

An Act to prevent Foreign Goods of certain descriptions heing brought from the United States of America into Canada; and to allow a greater quantity of Worsted Yarn to be exported from Great Britain to Canada.

[Passed 5th May, 1812.]

M/HEREAS it is expedient that Foreign Goods and Commodities, not of the growth of the territories of the United States of America, should not be brought from the said territories by inland navigation or land carriage into the Province of Upper and Lower Canada, to the prejudice of the trade carried on by sea from the United Kingdom to the said Provinces: Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, That no No goods, except Goods or Commodities whatsoever, except Goods and Commodities of the of American progrowth, produce, or manufacture of the territories of the United States of duce, shall be brought from the America, shall be brought from the territories of the United States of Ameri-United States into ca by inland navigation or land carriage, into the Provinces of Lower or Up-Canada on penalty perCanada, under the penalty of the forfeiture of the said goods or commodi- of forfeiture. ties, or the value thereof, together with the vessel or carriage in which the same shall be brought; to be sued for, recovered, and distributed in the like manner as is directed in any Act in the case of offences being committed against the Laws of Customs in any of this Majesty's Plantations in Africa and America.

to such regulations and restrictions as shall be directed and appointed by His Majesty, by and with the advice aforesaid, any thing in an Act passed in the twenty-eighth year of His present Majesty's Reign, entituled "An Act to explain, amend, and reduce into One Act of Parliament, several Laws now in being, for preventing the exportation of Live Sheep, Rams and Lambs, Wool, Woolfels, Mortlings, Shortlings, Yarn, and Worsted, Cruels, Coverlids, Waddings, and other manufactures, or pretended manufactures, made of Wool slightly wrought up, or otherwise put together, so as the same may be reduced to and made use of as wool again, Mattrasses, or beds stuffed with combed wool, or wool fit for combing, Fullers Earth, Fulling Clay, and Tobaccopipe Clay, from this Kingdom, and from the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, into foreign parts: and for rendering more effectual an Act passed in the twenty-third year of the reign of King Henry the Eighth, entituled, 'An Act for the Winding of Wool,' to the contrary notwithstanding.
