

## CAP. XI.

An ACT in addition to, and amendment of, and to reduce into one Act, the ſeveral Acts of the General Aſſembly, for regulating Carriers, and Owners of Waggonſ, Carts and Trucks, travelling through this Province.

Expired.

At the GENERAL ASSEMBLY of the Province of Nova-Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on the Sixth Day of June, Anno Domini 1770, in the Tenth Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George the Third, of Great-Britain, France, and Ireland, KING, Defender of the Faith, &c. and there continued by ſeveral Prorogations until the Eleventh Day of June, Anno Domini 1782, in the Twenty-ſecond Year of His ſaid Maſteſty's Reign; being the Fifteenth Seſſion of the Fifth General Aſſembly convened in the ſaid Province.\*

## CAP. I.

An ACT to reſtrain Hawkers, Pedlars, and Petty Chapmen, not duly licensed to Trade, travelling to and fro through the Country.

**W**HEREAS many inconveniences ariſe by hawkers, pedlars, and petty chapmen, paſſing to and fro through the country to vend goods and merchandize, that it is a detriment to trade, and an encouragement to many idle perſons, to avoid being employed in uſeful trades or huſbandry; for remedy whereof:

Preamble,

I. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Aſſembly, That from and after the publication of this Act, no hawker, pedlar, or petty chapman, or other trading perſon or perſons going from town to town, or other menſ' houſes, and travelling either on foot or with horſe, horſes or otherwiſe, carrying to ſell or expoſing to ſale in any houſe, or in any town or village, whereof ſuch perſon or perſons is not an inhabitant, except in any public fair or market, any wares, goods or merchandize, without previously giving bond, and taking out a licence, if at Halifax from the Clerk of the licences, and if in any other county or diſtrict in the Province, from the Clerk of the Peace, by conſent of at leaſt three Juſtices of the Peace for ſuch

Hawkers and Pedlars to be licensed, and pay a duty.
