

At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on the Sixth Day of June, 1770, in the Tenth Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George the Third, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. and there continued by several Prorogations until the Eleventh Day of June, Anno Domini 1781, in the Twenty-First Year of His said Majesty's Reign, being the Fourteenth Session of the Fifth General Assembly convened in the said Province. 21 George III – Chapter 5

An Act in addition to an Act, made in the Tenth Year of His present Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act for establishing the Toll to be taken at the several Grist-Mills in this Province."

Whereas in the act made in the tenth year of His present Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act for establishing the toll to be taken at the several Grist-Mills in this Province": the toll to be taken for bolting meal is not ascertained:

I. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, that every miller who keeps a bolting-mill, shall be obliged to bolt the meal of all wheat, rye, or buck-wheat, ground at his mill, when required, and that the toll to be taken for the same, shall not exceed one pint per bushel; and any miller refusing to comply herewith, shall be subject to the penalty specified in the afore-recited Act, and the same shall be paid, levied and applied, as directed in said Act.
