

At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on the Twentieth day of March, 1793, in the Thirty-Third Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George the Third, of Great Britain, France, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. being the First Session of the Seventh General Assembly convened in the said Province. 33 George III – Chapter 15

An Act, to amend an Act, passed in the Thirty second Year of the Reign of his present Majesty, entitled, “An Act, to prevent the Windsor and Hammond Plain Road, being injured by heavy loaded Carriages.”

Whereas inconveniences have been experienced, by the aforesaid act, from its being difficult to carry heavy loads, on carriages with wheels, the felloes of which, are nine inches broad:

I. Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, that after the publication hereof, it shall and may be lawful, for any person or persons, to pass and repass, on the said roads with carts, trucks, wagons or other wheel carriages, drawn by one horse, laden with logs, timber, and any other kinds of lumber, with wheels, the felloes of which, are of a less width, than nine inches, the said law or any other law, to the contrary notwithstanding. Provided, that all such carriages as aforesaid, drawn by more than one horse, shall have their felloes, of a width not less than six inches, and that this law shall continue for the space of one year, and until the end of the next session of the general assembly, and no longer.
