

*At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on the Twentieth day of March, 1793, and continued by several Prorogations to the Third Day of March, Anno Domini 1796, in the Thirty-Sixth Year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord George The Third of Great-Britain, France, and Ireland, being the Fourth Session of the Seventh General Assembly convened in the said Province. 36 George III – Chapter 6

**An Act to enable the Inhabitants of the Townships of Yarmouth and Argyle, to erect a Bridge over the Tusket River, near the Tusket Village.**

Whereas a bridge over the Tusket River, will greatly facilitate the communication between the townships of Yarmouth and Argyle, and the adjacent county:

- I. Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Assembly, that it may be lawful for the inhabitants of the said townships to erect and establish a bridge over the said Tusket River, from Salmon Trout Point, on the east side of the said river, to Titus Hallibus, on the west side.
- II. Provided always, and be it further enacted, that the said inhabitants of Yarmouth and Argyle, shall construct, and keep in repair, in the most convenient situation in the said bridge, a draw-bridge of sufficient width to admit of the passing and repassing of vessels and boats, up and down the said river.
