42 George III – Chapter 7

## An Act to enable the Trustees of the Government South Farm, to re-invest in the Crown a part of said Farm, wanted for Military purposes.

Whereas a certain part of the land, commonly called, and known by the name of, the Governor's south farm, granted in trust to the secretary, treasurer, and surveyor-general of the province, and their successors in office, has been required by the commander in chief of His Majesty's troops in this province, for military purposes, which said piece of land is bounded as follows:— one hundred and fifty-three feet: on the west, by military ground, one hundred and sixty three feet and eight inches: on the south, by military ground, one hundred and fifty four feet: and on the east, by the said farm, one hundred and sixty five feet.

I. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Assembly, that it shall and may be lawful for the said trustees of said farm, by and with the consent of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the time being, to sell, alienate or dispose of, the above described part of the said farm for military purposes, or to receive other land in lieu thereof, or to lease the said described piece of land for such term or terms of years, and upon such conditions, as they shall think proper, and to apply the proceeds of the sale or rents of said land, in such manner as they may think just, and equally beneficial to the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or to their successors in office: and the said land shall thenceforth be appropriated, agreeably to their conveyance thereof, to such purposes as His Majesty's military service may require. Provided, that nothing herein contained shall be of any force or effect until His Majesty's pleasure shall be known thereon.
