Act continued for one year. VIII. And be it further enacted, That this Act shall continue, and be in force, for one year, and no longer.

## CAP. VII.

An Act to revive, and continue, an Act, made and paffed in the twenty-ninth year of His prefent Majefty's reign, entitled, An Act for the better fupport of the Poor in the refpective Counties of this Province, by laying an Impost Duty on articles imported into this Province from the United States of America.

Preamble.

Act continued to 31st Dec. 1806. WHEREAS the above recited A& hath expired, and it is expedient that the fame fould be revived and continued:

I. Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor Council, and Affemtly, That the faid Act, and every matter, claufe as d thing, therein contained, fhall be revived, and continued : and the fame is hereby revived, and continued in force until the thirty-first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fix, and no longer.

## CAP. VIII.

An Act to revive and continue an Act, made and paffed in the thirtyfourth year of His prefent Majefty's reign, entitled, An Act to provide for the Grammar School in Halifax, and for other public purpofes therein contained.

Pieamble.

Act continued to 31st Dec. 1806. WHEREAS the above recited Act hath expired, and it is expedient that the fame finded be revived and continued:

I. Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant Governor, Council and Affembly, That the faid Act, and every matter, and thing, therein contained, shall be revived, and continued : and the fame is hereby revived, and continued in force until the thirty-first day of December, in the year one thou-fand eight hundled and fix, and no longer.

## CAP. IX.

An Act for granting Two Thousand Pounds for the encouragement of the Agriculture of this Province.

Preamble.

Bounty, perAcre for clearing and fowing lands. HEREAS the Riches and Prosperity of this Province very much depend upon the improvement and enerease of its Agriculture :

I. Be it therefore enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Affembly, That any perfon or perfons, being the owner or owners, tenant or tenants, occupier or occupiers, of any uncultivated Lands, who thall, between the first day of January, in the year one thousand eight

hundred and fix, and the fifteenth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and feven, cut down, burn, or clear off, the wood. growing, or being on, any part of fuch Lands not formerly cultivated, or cleared, and who shall, between the last day of August, one thousand eight hundred and fix, and the twentieth of June, one thousand eight hundred and feven, fow the fame with Wheat or Rye, and Grafs Seed, in a husbandlike manner, fit for a crop, and inclose the fame with a fence, fufficient to prevent damages by cattle, shall be entitled to receive, out of the Treasury of this Province the fum of twenty states, for each and every Acre so cleared, sowed and fenced, and in that proportion for any part of an Acre. Provided always, That no perfon, or perfons, shall be entitled to the above bounty for a less quantity than two Acres, so, as aforesaid, cleared. And Provided, also, That the whole sum to be expended in such bounties shall not exceed the sum of two thousand pounds.

II And be it further enacled, That any perfon, or perfons, intending to claim the bounty herein allowed. shall make the proof of having cleared, fowed and fenced, two Acres, or more, of uncultivated lands, before the Juffices in fome General or Special Seffions of the Peace for the County or Diftrict where fuch Lands lie, which proof fuch Juffices are hereby required to receive, and shall cause the Clerk of the faid Court to give a certificate thereof, fetting forth the fituation and quantity of the land to cleared as aforefaid, and that the fame has been cleared, fenced and cultivated, according to the true intent and meaning of this Act. 173- III. And be it further enacted, That before any bounty shall be payable by virtue of this Act, a fchedule of the Lands for which fuch bounty shall be claimed, shall be made in writing, and figned by the chairman of any General or Special Seffions in each and every County and Difirict, and counterfigned by the Clerk of the Peace, which schedule shall contain the names of the Claimants, and the number of Acres for which Certificates have been granted as aforefaid, and fhall be transmitted on or before the tenth day of July, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seven, to the Secretary's Office, and if it shall appear, on the receipt of the feveral fchedules and certificates fo granted, that the claims for bounties, certified as aforefaid, will exceed the fum of two thousand pounds, the faid fum of two thousand pounds shall be averaged, and divided, among the feveral claimants in proportion to the Land they may have fo cleared, and cultivated, and a Warrant shall, thereupon, be issued for the fhare, and proportion, which each County or Diffrict may be entitled unto, with a copy annexed of the schedule transmitted therefor, and made payable for the use of the several Claimants to fuch perfon or perfons as the Juffices, in Seffion, shall respectfully nominate as Truftee for the Claimants named in fuch fchedule, and fhall be paid in full fatisfaction of the Bounty pavable to them respectively, under and by virtue of this Act.

Whole amount of Bounties not to exceed 2000l.

Perfons claiming Bounty.

2000l. to be divided among the feveral Counties where improvements are uside.

CAP. X.

An Act in addition to, and amendment of, an Act, made in the fortieth year of His prefent Majefty's reign, entitled, An Act, in further addition to, and for altering and amending, an Act, passed in the thirty-fifth year of His prefent Majesty's reign, entitled, An Act, to amend, and reduce into one Act, the feveral Laws now in being relating to a Militia in this Province.

HEREAS the rates and prices of Dinners, Breakfasts and Suppers. for Soldiers cytablyfold Preamble. by the faid Act, are found insufficient, and the Keepers of Inns, Taverns and Houses, bound to furn sh the same, are great losers thereby, in consequence of the encreased prices of the different articles they are bound to supply for such Breakfasts, Dinners and Suppers, for Soldiers : I.
