At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on the Eighteenth day of November, 1806, in the Forty-seventh Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great-Britain, and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith, &c. being the Firth Session of the Ninth General Assembly, convened in the said Province.

47 George III – Chapter 1

An Act for applying certain Monies therein mentioned for the service of the year One Thousand Eight Hundred and Six, and for appropriating such part of the Supplies granted in this Session of the General Assembly, as are not already appropriated by the Laws or Acts of the Province.

May it please your Excellency,

We His Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the House of Assembly of His Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia, towards appropriating the supplies to His Majesty in this session of general assembly, and for supplying the exigencies of His Majesty's government, do humbly beseech that it may be enacted, and be it enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, that by or out of such monies as now are, or from time to time shall be and remain in the public treasury of this province, there shall be paid and applied,

The sum of 100 l. to the solicitor general, for his services for the same year.

And a further sum of 400 l. to the treasurer of the province, for his salary, and as comptroller and auditor of the public accounts, and in lieu of office rent, clerks, and all other contingent expences for the present year.

And a further sum of 116 l. 13 s. 4 d. to Scroop Barnard, Esquire, the agent for the province, resident in London, for his services for the present year.

And a further sum of 100 l. to the clerk of the council in general assembly; and as clerk to His Majesty's council for the same year.

And a further sum of 30 l. for defraying the expences of the council in general assembly for the same year.

And a further sum of 100 l. to the clerk of the house of assembly, for his services for the same year.

And a further sum of 100 l. to John Howe, printer, for printing for government and the general assembly, for the same year.

And a further sum of 50 l. to the keeper of the council chamber and house of assembly, for the same year.

And a further sum of 90 l. to be paid on the certificate of the commissioners of the revenue, to the land waiter of the port of Halifax, for his services for the same year.

And a further sum not exceeding 250 l. to be paid on the certificate of the commissioners of the revenue, at the rate of 7 s. 5 d. per day, to such person or persons as shall be employed, during the year aforesaid, by the collectors of impost and excise, and the inspector and searcher of the district of Halifax, as extra waiter or waiters for the port of Halifax; and at the rate of 5 s. per day to temporary waiters, together with 10 per cent to be paid out of the net proceeds of the government part of such seizure or seizures as such extra waiter or waiters, or temporary waiter or waiters, shall appear to have been instrumental in making.

And a further sum not exceeding 150 l. to the inspector and searcher, employed in the district of Halifax, for the present year, to be paid on the certificates of the said commissioners.

And a further sum of 80 l. to the guager and weigher, for the collector of impost and excise, in the same year.

And a further sum not exceeding 250 l. to be drawn by warrant, from the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, to defray the expence of such unforeseen public services, as may arise during the year aforesaid, the expenditure to be accounted for at the next session of general assembly.

And a further sum of 40 l. to the messenger to the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, for the time being, and his Majesty's council, as well in their legislative capacity, as otherwise, for the present year.

And a further sum not exceeding 800 l. to defray the contingent expences of the house of assembly, during the present session, the same to be drawn for by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, for the time being, on the certificate of the speaker of the house of assembly, and not otherwise.

And a further sum of 10 l. to the Reverend George Wright (officiating for the Reverend Robert Stanfer, Chaplain, to the house of assembly) for his attendance during the present session of general assembly.

And a further sum of 20 l. to Charles Stewart Powel, for his services as Serjeant at Arms, to the house of assembly, during the present session.

And a further sum of 15 l. to Israel Conkey, for his services as messenger to the house of assembly, during the present session.

And a further sum of 20 l. to the Secretary of the Province, to defray the expence of his office rent, for the present year.

And a further sum of 20 l. to the surveyor general of lands, to defray the expence of his office rent, for the same year.

And a further sum of 30 l. to the clerk of the commissioners of the revenue, for his services for the same year.

And a further sum of 10 l. to the secretary of the province for stationary, on account of warrants, to be drawn on the treasury, for the service of the same year.

And a further sum of 40 l. to be paid to the person, who has the care of the gunpowder in the town of Halifax, for the same year.

And a further sum of 50 l. to the clerk of the house of assembly for extra clerks, servants and other incidental expences during the present session, to be approved by the committee of public accounts.

And a further sum of 25 l. to the collector of impost and excise, for the district of Halifax, to defray the expense of his office rent, fuel and stationary, for the present year.

And a further sum not exceeding 530 l. to enable the commissioners of the revenue, to enter into a contract or contracts, for supporting and lighting the light houses, on McNutt's island, from the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and six, to the thirtieth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and seven.

And a further sum of 10 l. to the trustees of the law library, to be disposed of in such way as they may think proper, for the advantage of said library.

And a further sum of 20 l. to Adolphus Vieth, for his services as clerk to the adjutant general of militia, for the present year.

And a further sum of 222 l. 4 s. 5 d. to the attorney general, for his services for the same year, the same to be paid as heretofore.

And a further sum of 400 l. for the relief and support of the transient poor, of the province, for the present year, to be paid to the commissioners of the poor at Halifax.

And a further sum not exceeding 400 l. to discharge the balance now due to the commissioners of the island of Sable, and for the support of that establishment for the present year.

And a further sum not exceeding 200 l. to enable commissioners appointed by the Lieutenant Governor, to enter into a contract or contracts for supporting and lighting the light house, at the entrance of the gut of Annapolis, for the present year.

And a further sum not exceeding 400 l. for the repair of Sambro and Shelburne light houses, the expenditure of which to be accounted for at the next session of general assembly.

And a further sum of 50 l. to James Ratchford and James Noble Shannon, for the encouragement of a packet, to run between Windsor and Partridge Island, under such regulations as may be made and ordered by the justices in session for the county of Hants, for the present year.

And a further sum not exceeding 100 l. to be placed at the disposal of the president of His Majesty's council and the speaker of the house of assembly, to repair and fit up the rooms of the late Government House for public use.

And a further sum not exceeding 20 l. to the clerk of the house of assembly, to defray the expence of stationary, furnished for the commissioners of the revenue, and the house of assembly.

And a further sum not exceeding 6 l. to the clerk of the house of assembly, to defray the expence of fuel, for the house of assembly, during the present session.

And a further sum of 30 l. to James Gautier, for extra services performed by him as deputy clerk to His Majesty's council, in general assembly, during the present session.

And a further sum of 24 l. 7 s. 3 d. to the late commissioners for Indians, in full for expenditures by them made for the said service, per account.

And a further sum, not exceeding 30 l. to the surveyor general of lands, to prepare a plan of the province, for the use of the general assembly, with all the public roads, &c. marked thereon, on an enlarged scale of not more than two miles to an inch.

And a further sum of 4 l. to William H. Shey, in full for his services in exploring and laying out a road from Windsor towards Chester, per account.

And a further sum of 3 l. 10 s. to Elias Wheelock, for cutting two hundred and twenty rods of the road between Nictaur and Lunenburg.

And a further sum of 5 l. to George Henkell, in full for his services as health officer for the port of Annapolis, to the 4th day of October one thousand eight hundred and five.

And a further sum of 12 l. to Nathan Tupper, in full for his services as health officer for the port of Liverpool in the year one thousand eight hundred and six.

And a further sum of 23 l. to John M'Monagle, in full for his services as health officer for the port of Windsor in the year aforesaid.

And a further sum of 4 l. to William F. Bonnell, in full for his services as health officer for the port of Digby in the year aforesaid.

And a further sum of 7 l. to John Bolman, in full for his services as health officer at the port of Lunenburg in the year aforesaid.

And a further sum of 26 l. 1 s. to Henry Rutherford, in full for a drawback of the duty on two thousand and eighty-four gallons spirits, imported from Grenada in the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine.

And a further sum of 5 l. to David Currie, for a drawback of the excise duty, on a quantity of British merchandize exported by him to Jamaica, in the year one thousand eight hundred.

And a further sum of 29 l. 17 s. 6 d. to Thomas Goudge, in full for a drawback of the duties on two thousand three hundred and ninety gallons of rum, imported from Grenada in the year one thousand eight hundred and four.

And a further sum of 34 l. 11 s. 3 d. to John Pryor and Rufus G. Taylor, for a drawback of the duties on two thousand seven hundred and sixty-five gallons of rum, imported from Grenada in the year aforesaid.

And a further sum of 13 l. 14 s. 10 d. to Thomas Dobson and Company, for a drawback of the duties on a certain quantity of molasses and rum by them imported from Tobago in the year one thousand eight hundred and five.

And a further sum of 15 l. 17 s. 6 d. to Alexander Mitchell, in full for a drawback of the duties, on a certain quantity of rum and sugar by him exported to Newfoundland, in the year aforesaid.

And a further sum of 400 l. to Elizabeth Brenton, widow of the Honourable James Brenton, deceased, late one of the assistant justices of his Majesty's supreme court, to assist in relieving her and her daughters from their present distress.

And be it further enacted, that there be paid the sum of 769 l. 14 s. to Harthorne and Boggs.

And a further sum of 472 l. 10 s. to Isaac Hildrith.

And a further sum of 123 l. 18 s. 8 d. to John Merrick.

And a further sum of 50 l. 18 s. 1 d. to Richard Munday.

And a further sum of 35 l. 17 s. 8 d. to Jacob Miller and son.

And be it further enacted, that the sum of 228 l. 118 6½ d. be granted and paid to Alexander Baird, in full of all his demands against the new government house, to the 31st day of December, one thousand eight hundred and six, on his discontinuing the suit, instituted by him, in the supreme court, against the acting commissioner, and granting a receipt in full.

And be it further enacted, that Isaac Hildrith, the architect employed in building the new government house, be discharged from the 31st day of December, one thousand eight hundred and six, and that the sum of 50 l. be granted and paid to the said Isaac Hildrith, as a testimonial of the favorable opinion, entertained by the Legislature, of his ability, integrity, diligence, and zeal.

And be it further enacted, that a sum, not exceeding 500 l. be granted and paid to commissioners, to be hereafter appointed by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Commander in Chief for the purpose of erecting a light house on Briar Island, in the county of Annapolis – no part of the said sum to be drawn from the treasury, until a proper plan of the said light house, shall be furnished to his excellency the Lieutenant-Governor for his

approbation, and a contract entered into to complete the building; which contract shall not exceed the said sum of 500 l.

And be it further enacted, that there be granted and applied, the sum of 250 l. for the road from Sackville to the bounds of the county of Hants.

And a further sum of 100 l. for building a bridge over Great Salmon River, and repairing the road to Musquodoboit.

And a further sum of 30 I. for the road to Chezencook [Chezetcook] to Preston.

And a further sum of 25 l. for the road from Sheet Harbour to Mosquodoboit.

And a further sum of 125 l. for the road from Gay's River to Truro.

And a further sum of 25 l. for building a bridge over the North River in Onslow, (on the Post Road) in addition to 60 l. granted last year, and not yet drawn from the treasury.

And a further sum of 80 l. for building a bridge over Folly River in Londonderry.

And a further sum of 30 l. for repairing the Great Village Bridge in Londonderry, and the road from the said bridge to the line of the county of Cumberland.

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road from Dickie<s to the upper Sewack [Stewiack].

And a further sum of 100 l. to open a road from Moore's, at Gay's River, to the River Musquodoboit.

And a further sum of 50 l. for the road from Onslow to Tatamagushe [Tatamagouche].

And a further sum of 20 l. for the road from Brown's in Londonderry, towards Remsheg [Wallace].

And a further sum of 25 l. for the road from the ferry, at the mouth of Shubenacadie river, to the old bars in Truro.

And a further sum of 100 l. for the road from John Christie's in Truro, to the district line dividing Pictou from Colchester.

And a further sum of 200 l. for the road from John Christie's in Truro, to the district line dividing Pictou from Colchester.

And a further sum of 200 I. for the road from the district line, dividing Colchester from Pictou, to the Gut Bridge.

And a further sum of 30 l. for the road from the river John to Pictou.

And a further sum of 30 I. for clearing out the Windfalls and repairing small bridges from the upper settlement of the east river of Pictou to Musquodoboit, commonly called Sir John Wentworth's Road.

And a further sum of 30 l. for clearing out the road from William Robson's, on the east river of Pictou, to Fraser's point, being a continuance of the road aforesaid.

And a further sum of 65 l. for repairing the road and bridges from the west side of the west river of Margomishe [Merigomish], to the east side of the east river of Margomishe.

And a further sum of 150 l. for the road from Musquodoboit to the east branch of Saint Mary's River.

And a further sum of 25 I. for the road from Prospect to Saint Margaret's Bay Road.

And a further sum of 40 l. to open a road from Antigonish to near the bridge over the east branch of St Mary's River.

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road from the town of Stormont, at Country Harbour to the main road from Guysborough to St Mary's River.

And a further sum of 50 l. for the main road from the South bounds of the county of Hants, at Pence's Farm, to the Ardoise Hill.

And a further sum of 100 l. for the road from the Ardoise Hill to the Three Mile Plain near Windsor.

And a further sum of 25 l. for the road from the bridge over the Le Breau Creek to the Avon Bridge in Windsor.

And a further sum of 50 I. for the road from the bridge over the Kenetcook [Kennetcook] River near the Douglass Church to the River Shubenaccadie [Shubenaccadie] near Hall's, on the road leading to Colchester.

And a further sum of 80 I. for the main road through Douglas from the Rawdon road to the River Shubenaccadie leading to Colchester.

And a further sum of 40 l. to assist the settlers on the River Shubenaccadie to open a road of communication to the capital from David Whidden's in Douglas to the lower bridge over said river near Wardrobe's.

And a further sum of 40 l. to assist the inhabitants of Rawdon to improve the main road from the church in Rawdon to the main road in Douglas.

And a further sum of 25 l. to assist the inhabitants of Newport and Rawdon to improve the road from James Harvie's, in Newport, to the main road through Rawdon, leading to Halifax.

And a further sum of 60 I. to assist the inhabitants of Newport in completing the bridge over the River Kenetcook, they having subscribed and paid towards said bridge, more than that sum.

And a further sum of 25 l. to aid the inhabitants of Newport, to rebuild the bridge over the river Hebert, being on the main road from said township to Halifax.

And a further sum of 50 l. to assist the inhabitants of the shore of the bason of Minas, to improve the road between Petit and the River of Cockmagun [Cogmagun].

And a further sum of 100 l. for the road from Avon Bridge, to the stone bridge in Horton.

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road from Greenwood's to Pineo's, on the road leading to Annapolis.

And a further sum of 50 l. for the road from Pineo's, to Clermont in Aylesford.

And a further sum of 72 l. for the road from Silas Rand's in Cornwallis, to the Aylesford church.

And a further sum of 30 l. 16 s. 8 d. for the road leading from Scotch Bay in Cornwallis, in addition to the sum granted last year, and not yet drawn from the Treasury.

And a further sum of 20 l. to explore and improve a road leading from the main road in Horton through new Canaan to Nictaur [Nictaux].

And a further sum of 90 l. for the road from Avon Ferry, to the new bridge on the river Gaspereau by Mont Denson.

And a further sum of 15 l. to aid the exploring and cutting a road to lead from the main road from Partridge Island and Cumberland, across the River Macan towards the main road leading from Londonderry towards Amherst.

And a further sum, of 20 l. 10 s. for the road leading from the main road which leads from Partridge Island towards OEconomy [Economy].

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road leading from Partridge Island towards Cumberland.

And a further sum of 125 l. for repairing the bridge over Sciffabou River.

And a further sum of 25 l. for that part of the main road from Digby to Sciffabou between the house of Obadiah Griffin, and the house of John Saxon.

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road between Marr's brook and Sciffabou bridge on the public road between Digby and Clare.

And a further sum of 40 I. for that part of the post road leading from Annapolis to Digby between Lee's Mill and Long's Tavern.

And a further sum of 40 l. to aid the inhabitants of Long Island and Briar Island to open a road from the Grand passage to Petit passage in the township of Digby.

And a further sum of 100 l. for the road on the Peninsula below Digby between the Petit Passage and Gay Brook.

And a further sum of 50 l. for that part of the Liverpool road commencing at the southern line of the township of Annapolis and ending at the Ten Mile Tree on the said road.

And a further sum of 50 l. for that part of the public road in the Township of Annapolis between the house of Richard Armstrong and the house of Obadiah Morse.

And a further sum of 20 I. for repairing the bridge at or near Captain Bath's Farm in Granville on the public road leading through that township.

And a further sum of 20 l. 6 s. 8 d. for erecting a bridge over Bloody Creek (so called) on the post road leading through the township of Annapolis.

And a further sum of 50 l. for the road from Nictaur leading to Lunenburg.

And a further sum of 75 l. for the road from Shelburne to the bounds of Queen's County.

And a further sum of 129 l. 10 s. for the road from Shelburne to Barrington.

And a further sum of 100 l. for the road from Barrington to Pubnico.

And a further sum of 50 l. for repairing the bridge over Tusket river and the road from the head of Jaboug to Pubnico.

And a further sum of 100 l. for the road from Liverpool to Port Mutton [Port Mouton].

And a further sum of 30 l. for the road for Port Mutton to Port Jolly [Port Joli].

And a further sum of 30 l. for the road from Port Jolly to the bounds of Shelburne County.

And a further sum of 75 I. for the road from Saunder's Mill in the township of Yarmouth to the boundary of the County of Annapolis.

And a further sum of 150 l. for the road from Liverpool Falls towards the half way tree on the Nictaur road.

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road from Liverpool towards the bounds of Lunenburg county.

And a further sum of 100 l. to improve the road and erect bridges between Lunenburg and Nictaur.

And a further sum of 70 l. for the road from Pernette's Mills to Port Metway.

And a further sum of 35 l. for the road from Lahave river to the town of Lunenburg.

And a further sum of 80 l. for the road from Chester to Moose Horne Hill on the road leading from Chester to Windsor.

And a further sum of 50 l. for the road from Peter Hertle's on Mahone Bay to Chester.

And a further sum of 15 l. for the road from Kalback's Mill to Peter Hertle's at Mahone Bay between Chester and Lunenburg.

And a further sum of 160 l. for the road from the south bounds of the county of Cumberland on the road from Londonderry to Amherst.

And a further sum of 60 l. for the road from the bounds of King's County on the Parrsborough road to Henry Furlong's on the river Macan.

And a further sum of 35 I. for the road from the Harbour of Remsheg to the Cumberland Road, by Gabriel Purdy's.

And a further sum of 25 I. for the road from Remsheg, by Andrew Fushner's, to Richard Thomson's on the river Philip.

And a further sum of 20 l. for the road from Remsheg to Colchester, by Folly River.

And a further sum of 40 l. for the road from the upper end of Amherst to the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, and the river Shinimcas [Shinimicas].

And a further sum of 30 l. for the road from Barronsfield to Parrsborough [Parrsboro], by the river Hebert.

And a further sum of 30 l. to aid the inhabitants of the river Macan [Maccan], to open a road to the river Philip, a distance of about 12 miles, and part of which has been cut by the said inhabitants.

And be it further enacted, that there be paid the sum of 49 l. to Alexander Henry.

And a further sum of 1 l. to John Smith.

And a further sum of 7 l. 5 s. to John Pernette.

And a further sum of 5 l. to Samuel Sheldon Pool, Samuel Marshall, and Gabriel Van Norden.

And a further sum of 2 l. 10 s. to James Benvie.

And a further sum of 2 l. 10 s. to William H. Shey.

And a further sum of 4 l. to Robert M'Elhinney.

And a further sum of 4 l. 5 s. to Jacob Tobias.

And a further sum of 2 l. 10 s. to Alpheus Morse.

And a further sum of 8 l. 15 s. to William Campbell, being for their services as commissioners of roads and bridges, at the rate of 5 per cent on the amount of the sums severally expended by them.

And be it further enacted, that the several officers of government, who have salaries provided for them by this act, for the year one thousand eight hundred and six, up to the first day of July, in the present year one thousand eight hundred and seven, shall be paid, at the same rate, for and unto the thirty-first day of December, in the same year one thousand eight hundred and seven.

And be it further enacted, that the ninth, twelfth, fifteenth, sixteenth, eighteenth and nineteenth sections or clauses of the act made and passed in the forty-first year of His Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act for applying certain monies therein mentioned, for the service of the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and One, and for appropriating such part of the Supplies granted in this Session of General Assembly, as are not already appropriated by the Laws or Acts of the Province," shall be and continue in full force and virtue, until the thirty-first day of December, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seven, in as full and ample a manner as the same clauses would be were the same again herein repeated word for word.
