At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on Thursday the Sixth day of February, 1812, and continued by several Prorogations to Thursday the Thirteenth day of February, 1813, in the Fifty-third year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith &c. &c. being the Third Session of the Tenth General Assembly, convened in the said Province. From Henry H. Cogswell, The Statutes at Large passed in the General Assembly held in His Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia: from the Sixth Session of the Eighth General Assembly, to the Fifty-Sixth year of his Majesty's Reign. 53 George III – Chapter 17

An Act to continue and amend the Act, passed in the forty-eighth year of his present Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to provide for the accommodation and billeting of his Majesty's Troops, or of the Militia, when on their march, from one part of the Province to another;" and the Act, passed in the fifty-first year of his said Majesty's reign, in amendment of the said Act.

Be it enacted, by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, that the said act, passed in the forty-eighth year of his present Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act to provide for the accommodation and billeting of his Majesty's troops, or of the militia, when on their march from one part of the Province to another," except such part thereof as is amendment by this act; and the said act, passed in the fifty-first year of his said Majesty's reign, in amendment thereof – be, and the same is hereby continued until the fifteenth day of March, which will be in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, and from thence until the end of the next session of the general assembly, and no longer.

II. And be it further enacted, that, instead of one shilling allowed by the said act to the innkeepers for each meal furnished by them to soldiers when on their march, there shall be allowed and paid fifteen pence for each meal which shall be by them furnished to soldiers under the provisions of the said act, of which this is an amendment, and no more: any law, usage or custom, to the contrary notwithstanding.
