

*At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on Thursday the Sixth day of February, 1812, and continued by several Prorogations to Thursday the Fifth day of February 1818, in the Fifty-Eighth year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Third, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith &c. &c. being the Eighth Session of the Tenth General Assembly, convened in the said Province.*

58 George III – Chapter 30

**An Act in addition to the Acts to prevent the Forestalling Cord Wood.**

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Assembly, that it shall and may be lawful for the commissioners of the poor for the town of Halifax, to buy cord wood in the town of Halifax, or which shall be coming thereto, and to sell the same again to such persons as they shall think proper, for such seasonable advance upon the price paid by them as shall be sufficient to reimburse them for all the original cost of the said wood, and also for all charges, loss and expenses, sustained and borne in and about the purchasing and selling the same, without being liable to the pains and penalties by law imposed upon persons monopolizing cord wood.

II. And be it further enacted, that this act shall be in force for three years, and from thence to the end of the next session of the General Assembly.
