

At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of December, 1820, in the First year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Fourth, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith &c. &c. and ended on the Third Day of March, in the Second Year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Fourth, being the First Session of the Twelfth General Assembly, convened in the said Province. From William Hill & W. B. Bliss, The Statutes at Large, passed in the General Assemblies held in His Majesty's Province of Nova Scotia: from the Year 1817, to the year 1826, inclusive (vol. 3). 1 & 2 George IV – Chapter 10

An Act to make perpetual an Act to encourage Persons engaged in the Lumber Trade, and authorising Courts of Sessions to make regulations for preventing obstructions in bringing the same, with other articles, down the several Rivers of the Province: and also, the Act in addition to and amendment thereof.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, that an act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of His late Majesty's reign, entitled, "An Act to encourage Persons engaged in the Lumber Trade, and authorising Courts of Sessions to make regulations for preventing obstructions in bringing the same, with other articles, down the several Rivers of the Province;" and also the act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of His late Majesty's reign, in addition to and amendment of the before recited act, and every matter, clause and thing, in the said acts contained, shall be, and the same are hereby, made perpetual.
