

At the General Assembly of the Province of Nova Scotia, begun and holden at Halifax, on Thursday, First day of February, 1827, in the Eighth year of the Reign of our Sovereign Lord George the Fourth, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, King, Defender of the Faith &c. &c. being the First Session of the Thirteenth General Assembly, convened in the said Province.

8 George IV – Chapter 28

An Act to extend to Bridgetown, in the County of Annapolis, the Provisions of the Act relating to Commissioners of Highways, in Halifax, and certain other places.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council and Assembly, that an act, passed in the last session of the General Assembly, entitled, “An Act relating to Commissioners of Highways, in Halifax, and certain other places, and all the regulations and provisions thereof,” with every matter, clause and thing, therein contained, shall be extended, and the same are hereby extended, to Bridgetown, in the county of Annapolis; and it shall be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, or Commander-in-Chief for the time being, to appoint three respectable inhabitants and freeholders of Bridgetown aforesaid, to be commissioners of highways therein, for the purpose to supply any vacancy that may occur amongst such commissioners, and such appointment to renew when necessary, in the same manner as is pointed out and provided by said act.

II. And be it further enacted, that the jurisdiction, powers and authority of the said commissioners, shall be confined and restricted to the bounds and limits following, that is to say – commencing at Joshua Gidney’s eastward boundary line; thence running down the Granville main road, until it reaches the causeway on the western side of the aboiteau, including the same; thence running southwardly until it reaches the Annapolis River; thence along said river, until it meets the south end of said Gidney’s line.
