

sixty pounds sterling; To the Inspector of Chimnies at Montreal, a sum not exceeding sixty pounds, sterling; To the Inspector of Chimnies at Three Rivers, a sum not exceeding twenty-five pounds sterling; To the three residents on Anticosti to assist mariners and others in distrels, a sum not exceeding one hundred and thirty pounds, sterling; to defray the expenses of the Abstracts of Marriages, Baptisms and Burials, by the Prothonotaries of the different Districts, a sum not exceeding twenty-seven pounds, sterling; To defray the assessments on Public Buildings, a sum not exceeding two hundred and thirty pounds, sterling; To defray the several salaries of School Masters, appointed under the Act of the forty first George the Third, chapter seventeen, a sum not exceeding one thousand, eight hundred pounds, sterling, that is to say, to a School Master in the City of Quebec, a sum not exceeding one hundred pounds, sterling, and to the other School Masters, a sum not exceeding Fifty-four pounds, sterling, each.

Monies appropriated to be charged against the general funds of the Province.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the monies hereinbefore mentioned and appropriated, shall be taken from and charged against the general Funds of the Province, arising from any Act or Acts in force therein and from any of the Revenues of His Majesty, applicable to the purposes hereinbefore mentioned.

Expenditure of the money to be accounted for to His Majesty.

III. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the sums of money by this Act appropriated, shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall be pleased to direct.

### C A P. XXXIX.

AN Act to appropriate annually a certain sum of money therein mentioned to enable His Majesty to defray the Pension granted to Dame Louise Philippe Badelard, widow and relict of the late Honorable Jean Antoine Paret, in his life time, Speaker of the Assembly of this Province.

WHEREAS the Assembly of this Province in Session, did in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and seventeen, by an Humble Address to

to the Governor in Chief beseech His Excellency, that He would be graciously pleased to confer some signal mark of the Royal favor upon Dame Louise Philippe Badelard, widow and relict of the late Honorable Jean Antoine Panet, Esquire, late Speaker of the Assembly in testimony of the great and eminent services performed by the said Jean Antoine Panet to his country, for the space of twenty years and upwards, during which he had, with distinguished ability and integrity, presided in the Chair of the Assembly without any recompense or remuneration, and to the great detriment of his health and fortune, and did also assure His Excellency that whatever expenses His Excellency might think proper to be incurred upon that account, the Assembly would make good the same to His Majesty, Your late Royal Father of Glorious Memory; and whereas His Excellency the Governor in Chief was graciously pleased to answer, that in consideration of the just sense he entertained of the long services and great merits of Mr. Panet, the late Speaker of the Assembly, and in compliance with the aforesaid address, he had in His Majesty's behalf and as a special mark of His Majesty's Royal favor, conferred on the aforesaid Dame Louise Philippe Badelard, the widow of the aforesaid late Mr. Panet, an annuity or yearly sum of three hundred pounds, currency, to be held, received and enjoyed by the said Dame Louise Philippe Badelard, for and during her natural life; and whereas His Excellency did also by Message to the Legislative Council, inform the Legislative Council, that he had conferred upon the aforesaid Dame Panet, widow of the aforesaid late Speaker of the Assembly a pension of three hundred pounds, currency, *per annum*, during her natural life, to which the Legislative Council did by an Address to His Excellency the Governor in Chief, answer, and assure His Excellency that the Legislative Council would readily concur in such measure as might be required for securing the aforesaid pension in an effectual manner. Now therefore We, Your Majesty's Most dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Lower-Canada, in Provincial Parliament assembled, to enable Your Majesty to fulfil the beneficent views in this behalf of Your late Royal Father, His late Majesty King George the Third, of Glorious Memory, do humbly beseech Your Majesty, that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under, the authority of an Act of the Parliament of Great-Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " *An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America,*" and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that out of the unappropriated monies, which now are or shall hereafter may come into the hands of the Receiver General of the Province for the time being, there shall be annually paid by Warrant

or Warrants, under the hand of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Person administering the Government of the Province for the time being, the sum of three hundred pounds, current money of this Province, from the first day of May, one thousand, eight hundred and twenty-two, to Dame Louise Philippe Badlard, widow and relict of the late Honorable Jean Antoine Panet, in his lifetime Speaker of the Assembly of this Province, for and during her natural life.

Monies appropriated to be charged against the general funds of the Province.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the due application of the monies that shall be paid in pursuance of this Act, shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall be pleased to direct.

AN Act to appropriate certain annual sums of money therein mentioned, to enable His Majesty to defray the expenses of Pensions conferred by His Majesty, upon the Honorable James Monk and the Honorable Isaac Ogden, respectively.

Preamble.

WHEREAS the Governor in Chief did by a Message to both Houses of the Legislature of this Province, in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, signify the high sense entertained by Your Majesty of the services of the Honorable James Monk, Chief Justice of the Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal, during the last forty years of his life, and did also earnestly recommend that a liberal provision might be made for him on his retirement from office;—And Whereas the Governor in Chief, by another Message to both Houses of the Legislature in the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two, did also signify the high sense Your Majesty entertained of the services of the Honorable Isaac Ogden, one of the Judges of Your Majesty's Court of King's Bench for the District of Montreal, and did earnestly recommend that a liberal provision for him on his retirement should be made, in consideration of his long services and extreme age;—Now therefore, We Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects the Commons of Lower-Canada in Provincial Parliament assembled, having taken the same
