1 George IV – Chapter 22

An Act to appropriate certain sums of money therein-mentioned. (17th March, 1821.)

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN,

Whereas it is expedient to appropriate a sum of money towards repairing certain Bridges on the road or portage between the River de Caps and Lake Temiscouata [Lac-Témiscouata], and to defray certain expenses incurred by Lieutenant-Colonel Fraser, and Lieutenant Colonel Louis Bourdages, in the performance of certain duties as officers of Militia of this Province; May it therefore please your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Lower-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great-Britain, intituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America,' and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;" and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant-Governor or person administering the Government of the Province for the time being, by a warrant or warrants, under his hand, to advance and pay out of any unappropriated monies, that now are or that hereafter may come into the hands of the Receiver General of the Province for the time being, a sum of money not exceeding one hundred and fifty pounds, currency, for and towards repairing certain Bridges on the road or portage between the River des Caps, in the County of Cornwallis, and the Lake Temiscouata, and to the said Lieutenant Colonel Alexander Fraser, for certain disbursements by him made, in the performance of his duty as an officer in the Militia of this Province, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds, eighteen shillings, currency; and to the said Lieutenant Colonel Louis Bourdages, for certain disbursements by him made, in the performances of his duty as an officer in the Militia of this Province, the sum of fifty-four pounds, eleven shillings and one penny, currency.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that the due application of the monies hereby appropriated shall be accounted for His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form, as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall be pleased to direct.
