9 George IV – Chapter 3

An Act to continue and amend the Acts for the better securing the Navigation of the inner Bay of Passamaquoddy. Passed 5th April, 1828.

Be it enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor, Council, and Assembly, That an Act of Assembly made and passed in the third year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the better securing of the Navigation of the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; and to indemnify the Deputy Province Treasurer at Saint Andrews against any demands for monies collected for Tonnage Duties since the former Acts for the purpose expired," be continued; and the same is hereby declared to be in force until the first day of April, which will be in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-five, excepting so far as the same is hereby altered and amended.

II. And whereas the fourth Section of the said recited Act has been found ineffectual: Be it further enacted, that the said fourth Section of the said Act be, and the same is hereby repealed.

III. And be it further enacted, That the Master or Commander of every Ship or Vessel, inward bound, and entering the Bay of Passamaquoddy within Deer Island, shall, within twenty-four hours, and before any part of the cargo, if any, be discharged, or before any cargo shall be taken on board, make report at the office of the Deputy Province Treasurer at Saint Andrews, and pay him the Tonnage Duty imposed by the said Act: And in case any Master or Commander of any Ship or Vessel so entering as aforesaid, shall neglect to make such report, and pay such duty within twenty-four hours as aforesaid; he shall forfeit and pay the sum of five pounds, to be sued for and recovered before any one of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace for the said County of Charlotte, and applied to the purposes directed in and by the said recited Act.
