12 Victoria – Chapter 44

An Act to amend an Act to Insolvent Confined Debtors. Passed 14th April 1849.

I. Be it enacted by the Lieutenant Governor, Legislative Council and Assembly, That in any case where a notice of the examination of any Insolvent Confined Debtor shall have been given under the provisions of an Act made and passed in the sixth year of the Reign of King William the Fourth, intituled *An Act relating to Insolvent Confined Debtors*, or an Act made and passed in the seventh year of the Reign of King William the Fourth, intituled *An Act to amend an Act, intituled "An Act relating to Insolvent Confined Debtors,"* by any person or persons authorized to take such examination, it shall and may be lawful in case of the illness, absence, or inability to attend, of the person or persons who issued such notice of examination, for any other person or persons authorized to take examinations of confined debtors, who at the request of the person or persons who issued the notice of examination may attend for that purpose, to proceed to the examination of such confined debtor, and to hear and determine his application for support, and to make all such order or orders thereon and on any proceedings subsequently had in regard to the support or withholding the support of such confined debtor, as to such person or persons taking such examination may seem meet; provided always, that such examination shall be had and taken at the time and place specified in the notice of examination, and that an entry shall be made in the Minutes of such examination of the same having been taken by the person or persons who shall take the same, in lieu of the person or persons who issued the notice and the cause thereof.

II. And be it enacted, That this Act shall be in force as long as the Acts of which it is an amendment and no longer.
