## CAP. VII.

## AN ACT for Ascertaining the Population of this Colony and other Statistical Information.

[Passed 17th March, 1857.

WHEREAS it is expedient to make provision for Ascertaining Prambig: the Population of this Island, and other Statistical Information:

Be it therefore enacted, by the Governor, Legislative Council, and Assembly, in Legislative Session convened :-
I. That for the purposes of this Act, it shall be lawful for the Governor and Council to subdivide this Colony and its Dependencies into so many Divisions as may be deemed expedient, and to appoint so many competent persons to take the Census and other Statistical Information by this Act required, within the said Divisions and the

Governorand Council to subdivide: Wectora Districts of the C0 lony and for the pur
poses of this Act; ani appoint persons to take the Census. said Dependencies, respectively, as may in that behalf be necessary and every person so appointed shall discharge the duties required of him in such division to which he shall be appointed, as may be prescribed by the Governor in Council, and shall, before entering on the duties of his office, be sworn before one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace to the true and faithful discharge of the same, and shall, while engaged therein, conform in all respects to the orders and directions of the Governor and Council to be made in conformity with the provisions of this Act.

Dutien of persons appointed as aforessid.
II. Every person so appointed as aforesaid, shall make a return, with respect to the division or place to which he may have been appointed, of the information particularized in the Schedule to this Act annexed, and such returns shall be compiled within the times in the present year, and at such other periods, as are hereinafter provided; and that for the purpose of such compilation and return, it shall and may be lawful for every person so appointed as aforesaid; and he is hèreby required, within his division, to visit every House; and enter into and upon any Lands, Tenements, or otheiwise, as he shall judge expedient, for the execution of this Act, and then and there to ask all such questions of the persons within the division for which he may be appointed, as aforesaid, respecting: themselvesp the number and the quality of the persons constituting their respective families, and all other matters as shall be necessary for stating the particulars required to be stated concerning them in the said answers and returns; and every adult person refusing to apswer such questions, or any of them, shall for such refusal or false answer, forfeit a sum not exceeding Forty Shillings, to be recovered with costs, in a summary manner. before any one of Her Majesty's Justices of the Peace within the district in which the offence shall be committed, and in default of payment thereof it shall be lawful for such Justice to commit the Offender to gaol for any period not exceeding two Days.
III. It shall and may be lawful for the Governor to appoint one or more Stipendiary or Honorary Magistrates in each of the several divisions aforesaid; to examine and review the returns of the persons so to be appointed as aforesaid, in the said divisions réspectively ; and in any portions of this Colony or its Dependencies, where there is no resident Magistrate; to appoint some other fit and proper person for that purpose; and persons shall, on such examination and review, answer upon oath all such questions as may be put to them by the said Stipendiary or other Magistrate, or other person as aforesaid, and that if, upon such examination and review, it shall appear to the said Magistrate, or other person as aforesaid, that any such returns are imperfect, defective or erroneous, it shall and may be lawful for the examining Magistrate or other person as aforesaid, to examine witnesses, and to direct the person or persons presenting the same to amend such defect, error or imperfection, previous to such returns being certified as hereinafter mentioned.

#### Abstract

Vs On being satisfied of the general correctness and sufficiency of Returns on being erany such return as aforesaid, it shall be lawfui for the examining Ma- tifed to be filed in gistrate, or other person appointed as aforesaid, to certify, under 0fice. his hand, that such return is, to the best of his knowledge and belief, sufficient and correct; and such certificate shall, together with the said return, be filed in the Office of the Colonial Secretary, by the person who shall have compiled such return, by a day in that behalf to be appointed by the Governor, in such directions as aforesaid; and such returns shall be digested and reduced into order under the direction and superintendence of the Colonial Secretary, or by some other Officer or: Officers in his Department,and anabstract thereof shall be laid before the Legislature at its next Session.


VI. If any person so appointed as aforesaid shall wilfully compile penalty for false or make a return false in any of the particulars aforesaid, such person return, $\delta$. shall forfeit a sum not exceeding Fifty Pounds, to be recovered in any Court of Record, and in default of payment shall be subject to Imprisonment for any period not exceeding Six Calèndar Months, and shall further forfeit all compensation for his service.
VII. That the sum of Two Thousand Pounds, granted for the purposes of this Act, be appropriated towards the remuneration of the several persons to be appointed as aforesaid, and for other purposes, in carrying into effect the provisions of this Act, in this present year, in such manner as the Governor and Council may direct, and shall be paid by warrant, under the hand and seal of the Governor, upon the Receiver General, in favour of any person or persons, to be applied to the purposes of this Act.
VIII. The first GeneralCensus and Returns shall be takenbetween Wher Census io be the months of June and December in this present year, One Thousand taken. Eight Hundred and Fifty-seven, and, so far as may be practicable, the same shall be taken simultaneously; and a like General Census and Returns shall be taken between the same months, and in like manner, in every Tenth year hereafter. 'The Tables to be issued by the Governor and Council, first to be taken, shall be in the forms contained in the Schedule of Questions annexed hereto, with such additional enquiries as to the Governor and Council shall seem expedient.
