## CHAP. LIV.

AN ACT to provide for the re-payment of certain sums of Money advanced by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two, during the prevalence of the Asiatic Cholera.

## MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN:

W HEREAS His Excellency Sir John Colborne did during the year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Thirty-two, advance Preamble from his own private funds the sum of Four Thousand and Sixty-four Pounds, Three Shillings and One Penny Half-penny, to enable the

Justices of the Peace in the several Districts of this Province to mitigate

as far as should lie in their power the sufferings of the Inhabitants of this Province, and of persons emigrating thereto, occasioned by the calamitous visitation of that dreadful and mysterious disease called Asiatic Cholera, and to stay, in as far as human wisdom could devise, and the means put in their possession would enable them, the direful ravages of the same: and whereas it is expedient to make good to His Excellency the said sum so advanced by him, with the interest grown due upon the same: We therefore beseech Your Majesty, that it may be enacted; And be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province," " and by the authority of the same, That out of the rates and duties now levied and collected, or which may hereafter be levied and collected, and in the hands of the Receiver General of this Province and unappropriated, Licutenant Governor there be granted to His Majesty, the sum of Four Thousand, One Hundred and Fifty-eight Pounds, and Seven Pence Half-penny, to make good to His Excellency Sir John Colborne the said sum of Four Thousand and Sixty-four Pounds, Three Shillings and One Penny Half-penny, so advanced by him as aforesaid, and the Interest grown duc thereupon.
