36 George III – Chapter 5

An Act to repeal certain parts of an act passed in the thirty-third year of his Majesty's reign entitled, "An act to encourage the destroying the Wolves and Bears in different parts of this province."

Whereas it is found to be no longer necessary to encourage by a public bounty the destroying of bears in any part of this province; Be it therefore enacted by the king's most excellent majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the legislative council and assembly of the province of Upper-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under the authority of an act passed in the parliament of Great-Britain, entitled an act to repeal certain parts of an act passed in the fourteenth year of his majesty's reign, entitled "An act for making more effectual provision for the government of the province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the government of the said province," and by the authority of the same, That from and after the passing of this act, so much of a certain act passed in the thirty-third year of his majesty's reign, entitled, "An act to encourage the destroying of wolves and bears in different parts of this province," as enacts the payment of any sum or sums of money, for killing of any bear or bears, according to the provisions in the said act contained, shall cease and determine; and the said act in so far as it relates to the payment of such sum or sums or money for the killing of such bear or bears as aforesaid, shall in that respect be, and is hereby declared to be repealed; any thing therein contained to the contrary hereof notwithstanding.
