**An Act to make Good certain Monies issued and advanced by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in yursuance of several Addresses during the last Session. Passed the 7th Day of April, 1817.**

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Whereas, in pursuance of several Addresses to His Excellency Francis Gore, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor of your Province of Upper-Canada, bearing date the Twenty-sixth, Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth of March, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Sixteen last, passed in the Fifty-sixth Year of Your Majesty's Reign, several Sums of Money amounting in the whole to the Sum of One Thousand Five Hundred and Seventy-six Pounds and Eight Pence Half-penny, have been issued and advanced by Your Majesty, through His Excellency Francis Gore, Esquire, Lieutenant Governor, to the Clerks and other Officers of the Two Houses of Parliament for certain Contingent Expenses attending the last Session of Parliament, and to other Persons for certain Purposes stated in the several Addresses; May it therefore please Your Majesty, that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the Kings most Excellent Majesty by and with the Advice and Consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under the Authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled, "An Act to Repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the Fourteenth Year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, An Act for making more effectual Provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further Provision for the Government of the said Province," and by the Authority of the same, that out of the surplus Fund or Funds, subject to the Disposition of the Parliament of this Province, now remaining in the Hands of the Receiver General unappropriated, there shall be issued and applied the Sum of One Thousand Five Hundred and Seventy-six Pounds and Eight Pence Half-penny, to make good the Sum of Money which has been issued and advanced in pursuance of the aforesaid Addresses.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the due Application of the said Sum of Money pursuant to the direction of this Act shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall direct.
