2 George IV – Chapter 26

**An Act to remunerate the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery for past Services, and to provide for the future payment of that Officer. Passed 14th April, 1821.**

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Whereas it is expedient to provide for the payment of a Salary to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, and to remunerate him for past Services, We Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects the Commons of Upper Canada in Provincial Parliament assembled beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, and be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province'*" and by the authority of the same, That from and out of the rates and duties raised, levied and collected or hereafter to be raised levied and collected to and for the uses of this Province, and in the hands of the Receiver General unappropriated, there be granted to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, for the present year the sum of two hundred pounds, and annually in each and every succeeding year the sum of fifty pounds, which said sum of two hundred pounds and fifty pounds shall be appropriated applied and disposed of as follows, that is to say, To Samuel Peters Jarvis, Esquire, for past services as Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, the said sum of two hundred pounds; to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery, for the time being, annually in each and every year, the sum of fifty pounds, to commence and be payable from and after the first of March one thousand eight hundred and twenty one.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said sums of two hundred pounds and fifty pounds respectively, shall be paid by the Receiver General of this Province in discharge of such Warrant or Warrants as shall for that purpose from time to time be issued by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Person administering the Government of this Province, and shall be accounted for to His Majesty His Heirs and Successors through the Lords Commissioners of His Treasury, for the time being in such manner and form as His Majesty His Heirs and Successors shall be graciously pleased to direct.

III. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That this Act shall continue and be in force for four years, and from thence to the end of the then next ensuing Session of Parliament.
