2 George IV – Chapter 8

An Act to explain doubts which have arisen respecting the right of persons holding a Licence to keep a House of Public Entertainment to Retail Spirituous Liquors to be consumed out of their houses without any additional Licence. Passed 14th April, 1821.

Whereas doubts have arisen whether by the Laws now in force any person having a Licence to keep a House of Public Entertainment may by virtue of such Licence sell Spirituous Liquors by retail to be consumed out of his house, for removing such doubts, Be it hereby enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province,'*" and by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lawful for any person in this Province duly Licenced to keep a House of Public Entertainment for the retailing of Spirituous Liquors, to sell Wine, Brandy or other Spirituous Liquors by retail to be consumed out of his house in the same quantities as he may retail it within his house without any additional Licence for that purpose.
