2 George IV – Chapter 9

An Act to continue an Act passed in the fifty-fifth year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled "*An Act to repeal an Act passed in the fifty-fourth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act to supply in certain cases the want of County Courts in this Province'*" and to make further provision for proceeding to Outlawry in certain cases therein mentioned. Passed 14th April, 1821.

Whereas it is expedient to continue an Act passed in the fifty fifth year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled "*An Act to repeal an Act passed in the fifty fourth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act to supply in certain cases the want of County Courts in this Province and to make further provision for proceeding to Outlawry in certain cases therein mentioned.'*" Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province'*" and by the authority of the same, That the said Act, and every clause matter and thing therein contained, shall continue and be in force for eight years and from thence to the end of the then next ensuring Session of Parliament.
