2 George IV – Chapter 23

An Act for the relief of John Crysler, Esquire. Passed 17th January 1822.

Whereas John Crysler, Esquire, Collector of Customs at the Port of Cornwall in the Eastern District has by the Laws of this Province been prevented from receiving any per centage on the monies collected as duties at the said Port and paid into the hands of the Receiver General of this Province in consequence of the misconduct and neglect of his Deputy in not reporting the same to the Inspector General within the period prescribed by Law. And whereas, it is expedient to afford relief to the said John Crysler, Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled "An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province"*" and by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be Lawful for the Inspector General of this Province to allow to the said John Crysler as Collector at the said Port of Cornwall, the regular per centage to which the said John Crysler would by Law be entitled on all monies heretofore collected at the said Port and which may be paid into the hands of the Receiver General of this Province, as if the said monies had been accounted for according to and within the period prescribed by Law.
