2 George IV – Chapter 26

**An Act to make good certain Monies issued and advanced by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in pursuance of an Address of the House of Assembly. Passed 17th January, 1822.**

Most Gracious Sovereign,

Whereas, in pursuance of an Address of your Commons House of Assembly during its last Session, to His Excellency Sir Peregrine Maitland, Lieutenant Governor, of your Province of Upper Canada, the sum of One Thousand and Fifty Pounds Seventeen Shillings and one penny, half penny has been issued and advanced by your Lieutenant Governor, to the Clerks and other Officers of the two Houses of Parliament, to enable them to pay the contingent expences of the last Session of the Provincial Legislature, may it therefore please your Majesty that it may be enacted, And be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of An Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled "An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province and by the authority of the same.*" That out of the fund or funds subject to the disposition of the Parliament of this Province and in the hands of the Receiver General, unappropriated, there shall be issued and applied the sum of One Thousand and Fifty Pounds Seventeen Shillings and One Penny half penny to make good the said sum which has been issued and advanced in pursuance of the aforesaid address.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the due application of the said sum of money pursuant to the directions of this Act shall be accounted for to your Majesty through the Lords Commissioners of Your Majesty's Treasury in such manner and form as your Majesty your Heirs and Successors may be graciously pleased to direct.
