4 George IV – Chapter 14

An Act Granting to His Majesty a Sum of Money for the purpose therein mentioned. Passed 19th March, 1823.

Whereas it is expedient to grant to Your Majesty a sum of money further to compensate the services of the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of this Province, to lay at the foot of Your Majesty's throne the joint address of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of Your Majesty's Province of Upper-Canada, respecting the Commercial Intercourse and Financial Relations between the said Province and Lower-Canada; we, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons' House of assembly of Upper-Canada, beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, and Be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent majesty by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper-Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entituled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province," " and by the authority of the same, That from and out of the rates and duties raised, levied and collected, or hereafter to be raised, levied and collected, to and for the public uses of this province, in the hands of the Receiver General, and unappropriated, there be granted to His Majesty, his heirs and successors, the sum of one thousand pounds, which said sum of one thousand pounds shall be appropriated and applied in further compensating the said Commissioner, appointed for the purposes herein before mentioned.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the said sum of one thousand pounds shall be paid by the receiver General of this Province, in discharge of such warrant or warrants as shall for that purpose be issued by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or person administering the government of this Province, and shall be accounted for to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall be graciously pleased to direct.
