8 George IV – Chapter 21

An Act to authorize James Atkinson to convey to Trustees a Lot of Land, for purposes therein mentioned. Passed 17th Feb'y. 1827.

Whereas James Atkinson, of the Town of Kingston, in the Township of Kingston, in the Midland District, Esquire, hath, by Petition, requested Legislative authority to convey a certain Piece or Parcel of Land adjoining, the Village of Waterloo, in the said Midland District, being part of Lot Number Sixteen, in the Third Concession of the said Township of Kingston, containing One-fifth of an Acre, upon which a Brick School House has been Erected, to Trustees, for the purpose of having a School taught in the said Building.

Be it therefore enacted, by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, intituled, "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act, passed in the Fourteenth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;'*" and by the authority of the same, That it shall and may be lawful for the said James Atkinson, to convey the said Parcel of Land, by Metes and Bounds, for the purpose of having a School taught in such Building, to such Person or Persons as he may think proper, which Person or Persons, and their Successors, to be appointed in such manner as may be provided in any such Deed, shall have power and capacity to hold the said Estate for the purposes aforesaid, any Law or Statute to the contrary notwithstanding. Provided nevertheless, that such Person or Persons, and their Successors as aforesaid, as well as the Master and Teachers employed in such School as aforesaid, shall be British Subjects.
