

Laws of His Majesty's Province of Upper Canada, passed in the year 1829. York: Robert Stanton, 1829.

10 George IV – Chapter 14

An Act to provide for the Survey of a part of the Township of Oxford, in the Johnstown District. Passed 20th March, 1829.

Whereas the Inhabitants of the tenth Concession of the Township of Oxford, in the District of Johnstown, have by Petition set forth that the division line between the said Concession and the ninth Concession of the said Township hath never been Surveyed and ascertained, and have prayed that an Act may be passed to authorise the Survey of the said Line: And whereas it is expedient, in order to prevent disputes and litigation, that the prayer of the said Petition should be granted.

Be it therefore enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Legislative Council, and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of, and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled, "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province;*" and by the authority of the same, that it shall and may be lawful for the Surveyor General of the Province, or person acting in that Capacity, for the time being, to cause such line to be duly Surveyed, and a plan and report thereof, to be returned to his Office by some competent, and disinterested Surveyor, and that such line, when Surveyed and ascertained, under the authority of this Act, shall be deemed and considered as the true and unalterable boundary between the said Concessions.

II. Provided, always, however, and be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, that no such line shall be run or ascertained by the authority of this Act until the parties or persons requiring the same shall have given proper security for the payment of all reasonable expenses attending the same.
