2 William IV – Chapter 18

An Act to repeal part of an Act passed in the Fourth year of His Late Majesty's Reign, entitled "*An Act to divide the County of Carleton, in the Bathurst District.*" Passed 28th January, 1832.

Whereas by an Act passed in the Fourth year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled "*An Act to divide the County of Carleton, in the Bathurst District,*" it was among other things provided, that nothing in the said Act contained should extend or be construed to extend to give to the Counties of Lanark and Carleton a greater increase of Representation in the House of Assembly of this Province than by Law these Counties would have been entitled to if the said District had not been divided into two Counties: And whereas the Population of these Counties renders it necessary that they should be represented in the House of Assembly by more than one Member each: Be it therefore enacted, by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign, entitled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec, in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province,'*" and by the authority of the same, That so much of the said recited Act as limits the Representation of the Counties of Lanark and Carleton be, and the same is hereby repeated.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That after the passing of this Act it shall and may be lawful for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Person Administering the Government of this Province, to issue Writs for the Return of One Member for each of the said Counties, in addition to the Members now serving, in the same manner as the Governor, Lieutenant Governor or Person Administering the Government issues Writs for the Return of Members in cases of a General Election of Representatives to the Provincial Parliament.
