

Laws of His Majesty's Province of Upper Canada, passed in the year 1832. York: Robert Stanton, 1832.

2 William IV – Chapter 27

An Act granting to His Majesty a Sum of Money for the purposes therein mentioned. Passed 28th January, 1832.

Most Gracious Sovereign.

Whereas Your Majesty's faithful Commons did, in the first and second Sessions of the Ninth Parliament, and in the first Session of the Tenth Parliament, vote the following sums of Money to the undermentioned persons viz:—

To the late Clerk of the Honorable the Legislative Council, the sum of Two Hundred Pounds.

To the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, the sum of One Hundred Pounds.

To the Door Keeper of the Honorable the Legislative Council, the sum of Forty Pounds.

To the Clerk of the House of Assembly the sum of Two Hundred Pounds.

To Valentine Gill the sum of Forty Pounds: and—

To the Sergeant-at-Arms the sum of One Hundred Pounds.

And whereas Your Majesty's faithful Commons are desirous by Law to provide for the payment of the aforesaid sums to the before mentioned persons, or their representatives, We beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted: And be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled, "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's Reign entitled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province,'*" and by the authority of the same, That out of the rates and duties raised, levied and collected, or hereafter to be raised, levied and collected, to and for the public uses of this Province, and in the hands of the Receiver General, and unappropriated, there be granted to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, the sum of Six Hundred and Eighty Pounds; which said sum of Six Hundred and Eighty Pounds shall be paid by the Receiver General of this Province to the persons aforesaid, or to their representatives, in the aforesaid sums respectively, in discharge of such Warrant or Warrants as shall be issued by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or Person Administering the Government of this Province in their favor; and be accounted for through the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the time being, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall be graciously pleased to direct: Provided

always, that the sum of Two Hundred Pounds granted to the late Clerk of the Honorable the Legislative Council shall be paid to the Widow of that Officer, any thing herein contained to the contrary notwithstanding.
