5 William IV – Chapter 32

An Act to make good certain Monies advanced by His Excellency to defray the expenses incurred by the Cholera in 1834. Passed 16th April, 1835.

Most Gracious Sovereign.

Whereas His Excellency Sir John Colborne did, during the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-four, advance upon his own responsibility, the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred and Fifty Pounds, to enable the different Boards of Health in the several Districts of this Province to mitigate, as far as lay in their power, the sufferings of its Inhabitants, occasioned by the Asiatic Cholera; And whereas it is expedient to make good to His Excellency the said sum so advanced by him; we beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, And be it enacted by the King's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled "*An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's reign, entitled 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province,'*" and by the authority of the same, That out of the rates and duties now levied and collected, or which may hereafter be levied and collected, and in the hands of the Receiver General and unappropriated, there be granted to His Majesty the sum of Two Thousand One Hundred and Fifty Pounds, to make good to His Excellency Sir John Colborne, the like sum of Two Thousand One Hundred and Fifty Pounds so advanced by him as aforesaid.

II. And be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That the money authorised to be issued by this Act shall be paid by the Receiver General of this Province, in discharge of any Warrant or Warrants issued for that purpose by the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, or person administering the Government of the same, and shall be accounted for to His Majesty's, through the Lords Commissioners of his Treasury, in such manner and form as His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors shall be pleased to direct.
