1 Victoria – Chapter 58

**An Act granting to Her Majesty a certain sum of money, for the purposes therein-mentioned.
Passed 6th March, 1838.**

Most Gracious Sovereign:

Whereas it is expedient and just that the sum of Nine Pounds, Ten Shillings, should be paid to John Farrell, of Brockville, for provisions furnished by him to destitute Emigrants, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-two: We therefore beseech Your Majesty that it may be enacted, And be it enacted, by the Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of Upper Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of Great Britain, entitled, "An Act to repeal certain parts of an Act passed in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's reign, entitled, 'An Act for making more effectual provision for the Government of the Province of Quebec in North America, and to make further provision for the Government of the said Province,'" and by the authority of the same, That there be granted to Her Majesty, out of the rates and duties already raised, levied and collected, or hereafter to be raised, levied and collected, and in the hands of the Receiver General of this Province, and unappropriated, the Sum of Nine Pounds, Ten Shillings, to enable Her Majesty to pay the said sum to the said John Farrell.
