6 Victoria – Chapter 29

An Act to authorize the Court of Chancery to admit William Vynne Bacon to practise therein as an Attorney and Solicitor. 12th October, 1842.

Whereas William Vynne Bacon, of the Town of Kingston, in the Midland District, gentleman, hath by his Petition represented that he is a duly admitted Attorney and Solicitor, and has practised in the Courts of King's Bench, and Common Pleas and in the High Court of Chancery in England for a period of seven years and upwards, and that he has for fifteen months last past been studying with a practitioner in this Province, and hath prayed that an Act may be passed to authorize the Court of Queen's Bench, and also the Court of Chancery, respectively, in and for that part of this Province formerly called Upper Canada, to admit him to practise therein respectively as an Attorney and Solicitor; And whereas it is expedient to comply in part with the prayer of the said petition: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, and of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and intituled, An Act to Re-unite the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, and for the Government of Canada, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, that it shall and may be lawful for the High Court of Chancery in and for that part of this Province formerly called Upper Canada, in the discretion of said Court, to admit the said William Vynne Bacon to practise as an Attorney and Solicitor in the said Court; any Law or Statute to the contrary notwithstanding.
