18 Victoria – Chapter 93

## An Act to connect the Office of the Supervisor of Cullers with the Crown Land Department. Assented to 30th May, 1855.

Whereas it is expedient and necessary that the Office of Supervisor of Cullers in Quebec should be connected with the Crown Land Department, for all purposes of information and statistics, and the general government of the trade, as well as with the view of being made auxiliary to the Collection of the Revenue accruing from Timber cut on Public Lands: Be it therefore enacted by the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and of the Legislative Assembly of the Province of Canada, constituted and assembled by virtue of and under the authority of an Act passed in the Parliament of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and intituled, *An Act to re-unite the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, and for the Government of Canada*, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, as follows:

I. In all matters not affecting the actual culling and measurement of Timber, Lumber or other Wood, the Supervisor of Cullers shall be deemed to be an Officer of the Crown Land Department, and shall render, through the Commissioner of Crown; Lauds, the Accounts and Statements required by the nineteenth Section of the Act eighth Victoria chapter forty-nine, to be rendered to the Governor, and all such other accounts and statements as the Commissioner of Crown Lands shall require from him.

II. All appointments in the Supervisor's Office shall in future be made by the Governor in Council.

III. It shall be lawful for the Supervisor of Cullers to endorse upon the specifications of measurement of Timber, Lumber or other Wood, the amount of Crown dues accrued thereon, and to withhold such specifications from the parties interested, therein, until the said Crown dues are paid or secured to the satisfaction of the Crown Timber Agent appointed to collect the same; and further to withhold such specifications until the Crown Timber Agent has received satisfactory evidence of the quantities of Timber respectively exempt from and subject to the Crown dues.
